Dear Ilana,

As block chair for MedSci 530A Circulatory Systems, the core medical student course in cardiovascular, pulmonary and renal physiology and pathophysiology, I would like to take this opportunity to recognize your amazing work as a small group leader in the course again this year.

We obtain evaluations from the students in each of the small groups each year. Attached to this letter, you will find a copy of your evaluations including the numerical scores and written comments. You received a rating of 5.8 on a scale of 0 to 6 on the dimension of "Effectiveness with Subject Matter," 5.8 on a scale of 0 to 6 on the dimension of the students' confidence in your knowledge and 5.9 on a scale of 0 to 6 on the dimension of instructor enthusiasm. All of these scores are well above the average score for the fellow cohort and, in fact, are nearly as high as any fellow received this year. In addition to these great numerical scores, you received a large number of extremely positive written comments from the students, far more than most small group leaders usually receive.

This is now the second year in a row that you have not only participated as faculty in the course but have also garnered extremely strong ratings for your work. Based on these evaluations as well as my own personal observations during some of the course sessions, it is clear that you have a great career ahead of you as a medical educator.
